Wonderblock Redevelopment Public Hearing

In the meeting on January 10, 2023 at 6 pm, the Ogden City Council will hold a public hearing before the consideration of two bonds to fund the WonderBlock redevelopment project and a paid parking management system. The hearing will take place in the Ogden City Municipal Building in the Council Chambers on the third floor. You can also watch the hearing over Zoom. The meeting ID will be: 891-4742-5415



WonderBlock is a large-scale, mixed-use development combining residential dwellings, retail, office services, food, beverage, and hospitality. A project of this size would require a more comprehensive approach to parking for residents, businesses, and visitors in the downtown area. As such, a separate proposal is being considered to develop and implement a paid parking management system in downtown Ogden. This will include the management of two parking structures and paid on-street parking.

Ogden City administration is proposing to move forward with an agreement with Centerville-based developer JF Capital that would necessitate the Ogden City Redevelopment Agency (RDA) to finance \$64 million toward the development of WonderBlock and an additional \$53.5 million toward the parking structures, funded by the Municipal Bonding Authority (MBA). JF Capital would commit \$124 million for the mixed-use development.

It's proposed that Ogden City issue a tax increment and sales tax revenue bond to fund the RDA's portion of the development, with a max par amount of bond not to exceed \$75 million. To fund the parking structures, it's proposed the city issue a lease revenue bond through the MBA, with a max par amount of bond not to exceed \$85 million. The tax increment and sales tax revenue bonds issued by the RDA will be funded with tax increment generated by the project and BDO Lease Revenue funds. The debt service for the parking bonds issued by the MBA would be paid using revenue generated by the paid parking program. These projects will not use funds from the property taxes of Ogden residents.

Snow Plow Ordinances

Be aware of snow removal ordinances effective now until March 15. Follow these practices to help keep citizens and snowplow drivers safe this winter.

- **Do not blow or shovel snow onto the streets.** It is against the law due to freezing snow becoming an accident risk on the road (*Ordinance 7-2-8A*). Be sure snowblower spouts blow snow back onto the home property instead of onto the street. Residents are responsible for sidewalk snow removal within 12 hours after a storm starts. Please, do not shovel snow back onto the streets.
- **Move vehicles off of the street during snowstorms to avoid blocking snowplows.** From November 1 - March 15, please keep vehicles off the street to help eliminate accidental damage from other cars that may lose control on slick roads. (*Ordinance 10-5-21A*)
- **Clear snow around fire hydrants.** (*International Fire Code Section 508.5.5*) Fire hydrants in front of homes must be clear of snow at all times to remain accessible to the fire department. Residents unable to get hydrants cleared can call the city for assistance.

Emergency Preparedness: Winter Driving

It's no secret that driving in the winter can be an

absolute nightmare. According to the DOT, there are approximately 1.2 million weather-related vehicle crashes every year leading to, on average, nearly 6,000 fatalities and over 445,000 injuries. We could all use a little refresher when navigating those slick roads this winter.



Know before you Go - Ready your vehicle

Check your vehicle's battery, wipers, coolant, tires, and other systems most affected when the temperature drops. Make sure your tires have good tread. Clear your car of snow and ice from the windows, headlights, and taillights. Stock your vehicle with a winter supply kit that includes a phone charger, batteries, blankets, a flashlight, first aid kit, food, sand, a shovel, an ice scraper, and jumper cables. Make sure to check the forecast and check road conditions. Change your plans if travel is hazardous.

While on the Road

The first thing to do is to stay alert, and keeping your gas tank over half full can be helpful as the temperature drops. It's important to take frequent breaks on road trips and to drive slower than usual, leaving more room between you and surrounding vehicles. Give snow plowers plenty of room to work and only pass when it is safe.

Always Focus on Safety - Accidents happen

Always wear your seatbelt and ensure everyone in your vehicle does the same. If you're involved in an accident, try to pull your car off the road and use your hazard lights, reflectors, or flashlights to warn other drivers. Stay off the road, dial 911, and wait for the police to arrive. Don't text or make phone calls, speed, or drive under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
