Idle Free Week Encourages Air Quality Education

February 3-9 is Idle Free Week in Ogden. Here are four simple ways to reduce emissions on a daily basis that contribute to improved air quality and help the City be idle free all year round.

- Don't turn the key until you're ready to leave.
 Choose not to warm up your vehicle in the morning. Newer, gasoline-powered vehicles do not need idle time on cold mornings.
- Turn off your vehicle while waiting in long lines. If your vehicle is not in active traffic, turning your car off for a few moments in the drive-thru or drop off/pick up lines can make a meaningful difference.
- Instead of using the drive-thru, just walk in.
 Avoid idling and wasting gas in long
 drive-thru service lines by walking into the establishment. Every step counts.
- **Discover and use alternative transportation options.** Using the bus, train or other public transportation options help to decrease emissions caused by too many cars on the road. Walking, bicycling and even carpooling are healthier options than driving solo.

CERT Classes Held Each Thursday in March

A Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) basic training course begins March 7 and will be held each Thursday through March 28. These classes last from 6-9 p.m. at the Ogden Valley Branch Library in Huntsville (131 S 7400 E). The course fee of \$35 pays for personal CERT safety gear including: a hard safety helmet, reflective safety vest, leather work gloves, safety glasses, respiratory protection mask and training materials. Register on the Weber County CERT website for this training course that consists of two sections:

- 1. Start and complete the self-paced online portion at: utah.instructure.com/ register. Use the join code: **RR3BX6** after clicking "I'm a Student". Course time is approximately 9-hours and is required before attending the in-class hands-on training in March. Email a copy of the completed on-line certificate to the course coordinator: Lance Peterson (Ipeterso@co.weber.ut.us)
- 2. Attend the in-class hands-on skills development and practice section on Thursdays, March 7, 14, 21, and 28. Once the in-class skills portion is completed, an official certificate of course completion will be issued.

Emergency Preparedness Message: Earthquakes

Utah's greatest hazard area for an earthquake is along the Wasatch Front, and this area is overdue for a large magnitude earthquake. When it happens, the system will be overwhelmed and citizens must be prepared by taking these precautions:

- Move or secure small items that could fall. Look for books, potted plants and heavy objects that could fall and cause injuries during an earthquake.
- Be aware of the threat of heavy objects and top-heavy furniture. Determine how these items can be secured or be ready to move away from them in an earthquake. Be ready to move away from windows that can also break. Ensure water heaters and other major appliances are strapped down appropriately and have flexible connectors.
- Store emergency supplies and make emergency plans: Prepare 72-hour emergency kits for each family member. Know the emergency procedures of locations that family members frequent (School, home, work, etc.).
- Register for the CODE RED mobile app. This is the best way to get emergency notifications for the area. Details can be found on the City website. During the earthquake stay calm, find protection and "Duck, Cover, and Hold On" until it is safe to move. Get away from outside buildings, trees, telephone and electrical lines. Drive away from under/overpasses, stop in a safe area, and stay in the vehicle.
